Dissertation shall be completed under the supervision of an assigned faculty of the Department. The dissertations hall be of 16 credits carrying 100 marks which shall be evaluated by one external examiner (who shall not be an employee of the University) and Supervisor. However, Head/Coordinator of the Department shall be the Chairperson of the evaluation board. This 100 marks evaluation shall be as per Ordinance of the University and strictly restricted only to the assessment of the quality of dissertation. Based on the prepared dissertation, every student shall make a presentation (preferably Power Point) of at least 20 minutes duration describing about the findings of the conducted study followed by the vivavoce examination of the student.
